Flu

- In week 4 of the year, 4.5% of reported ER visits were due to influenza-like illness. During the same week last year, that percentage was 13.3%, before peaking in weeks 5 and 6.
- Two influenza-associated pediatric deaths have been reported in the region.
- Since the end of the holiday break, influenza activity in schools has increased rapidly, with ILI being responsible for 7.8% of reported absences in week 4.
 - Last flu season, ILI was responsible for 14.8% of absences during week 4.
 - Several flu outbreaks in schools have also been reported in different parts of the region over the last 2 weeks.
- H1N1 is the predominating strain nationally, but H3N2 is circulating at higher levels in the southeastern US.
 - 58% of influenza A specimens subtyped at Texas Public Health laboratories have been H3 so far this season.

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Mumps

- As of 2/4/19, there have been 150 cases of mumps associated with 21 immigration detention centers in Texas reported since September 2018. The majority of these cases have been in immigrants but a small amount has been reported in staff of these facilities. As of 1/24/19, there was no documented transmission to the community. One of these facilities is within our region and had two cases of mumps as of 2/4/19.
 - As a reminder, please consider mumps as a diagnosis for those individuals presenting with swelling of the parotid or salivary glands, possibly preceded by low-grade fever, myalgia, malaise, or headache particularly if the individual has traveled out of state or has a known exposure to mumps. The ideal testing for mumps is a buccal swab for PCR testing and viral isolation. Specimens should be collected as soon as possible, but can be done up to 10 days after onset. Serology can also be collected for IgM antibody testing ideally three to 7 days after onset. Diagnosis or suspicion of mumps is required to be reported within one working day to your local health department.

Medical Tourism Associated with Drug Resistant Infections

- Recently, some US residents returning from Tijuana, Baja California, Mexico, were diagnosed with infections caused by a carbapenem-resistant form of *Pseudomonas aeruginosa* (CRPA) bacteria. These infections were carbapenamase producing CRPA. VIM is what we call this carbapenamase. It stands for verona integron-mediated metallo-beta-lactamase.
- All of the travelers with this particular infection had an invasive medical procedure performed in Tijuana. Most (but not all) of them had weight-loss surgery. Over half of those infected had their surgery done at the Grand View Hospital. CDC continues to receive reports of infections in patients reporting surgery at Grand View Hospital, including patients who reported undergoing surgery in 2019.
- CDC recommends that:
 - travelers to Tijuana, Mexico, not have surgery at the Grand View Hospital until the outbreak is over.
 - patients who had surgery at Grand View Hospital and are experiencing signs of an infection—such as redness, pus or swelling at the surgical incision site or fever—seek medical care immediately. Serious complications can result without prompt treatment. To guide effective treatment, patients should tell their healthcare providers about their travel and all medical care or surgeries they had out of the country.
- Mexican health officials identified concerns about medical device and instrument reprocessing, including that the facility did not follow recommended procedures for assuring the quality of sterilization processes. As a precaution, CDC also recommends that patients who had surgery at Grand View Hospital on or after

August 1, 2018, talk to their healthcare provider about getting tested for the bloodborne pathogens hepatitis B virus, hepatitis C virus, and human immunodeficiency virus (HIV), even though the risk for developing one of these infections is low.
